

## **2017 Embassy of Japan Business Seminar: Brexit and the Japan-EU Economic Partnership Agreement**

### Part I: Brexit

Speech I (14:10-14:40)

- Mr. Rory Montgomery, Second Secretary General, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade:

*Brexit negotiations between the EU and the UK*



Mr Rory Montgomery joined the Department of Foreign Affairs in 1983. He spent most of the 1990s working on Northern Ireland issues and was a member of the Irish team which negotiated the Good Friday Agreement. He was promoted to Assistant Secretary and Political Director in 2005. From April 2009 until September 2013, Rory Montgomery was Ireland's Permanent Representative to the EU, and then spent a year as Irish Ambassador to France. From August 2014 to October 2016 he was Second Secretary General, Department of the Taoiseach, with responsibility for EU affairs, and in October 2016 returned to the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade as Second Secretary General with responsibility for EU issues, including official-level coordination on Brexit.

Ambassador Kodama joined the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1976 before taking up the post of Ambassador Extraordinary & Plenipotentiary Deputy Permanent Representative of Japan to the United Nations in August 2010. Ambassador Kodama was appointed as Permanent Representative of Japan to the OECD in 2013 and as the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Japan to the European Union in 2016.
